



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

I was able to use blocks left over from another quilt. I think it was called a stack and slash quilt. You had to use a fabric that had a large repeat pattern on it.

This is a table runner for the new hospice. I picked up the blue/green leafy fabric from Judy Siegner at a guild meeting and challenged myself to use it as a background instead of the focus. I would've liked a bit more of it once I got working on it (to make it longer and wider), but I made it work. The curved edges are made by using a diagonally-folded square and then turning under the diagonal. I hand appliqued those edges. With my walking foot, I quilted it by echoing the shapes. I used bias binding so I could go around the curved corners.



This is a table runner for the new hospice. I was given some 1½" squares and a started project from Betty Dietrich's stash a while ago. I created this table runner from them. It's quilted with a walking foot through every other diagonal.



This is a table runner for the new hospice. I was looking for a UFO to quickly finish, and found 12 nine patches sewn together with sashing. I think it was going to be the centre of a medallion style quilt. I rearranged them with help from my seam ripper, made 3 more, quilted it with a walking foot in the seam ditches, and it's not a UFO anymore:)
